I think you want to take note of how much you love baseball and being around baseball and anything you pursue MUST include it for you to be happy.
<b>Tools</b>	I want you to look through the PowerPoint I am sending you called Jobs in Sports and I want you to research any of the careers that sound interesting. They are jobs in sports other than playing. You can take any college major and apply it to baseball if you try hard enough and that is what the PowerPoint shows. Even though they are not all baseball and they include other sports, substitute them as baseball in your mind.
<b>Research</b>	<p>I want you to look at this website and read REAL job descriptions from real baseball teams. You will see jobs related to sales, marketing, concessions, security, team management, field maintenance, and so much more. These are good part time jobs through college in your passion area! I would also see if you could volunteer there coordinating events maybe for the community as they do a lot of events year round. This may help you see more of the business side of things and how the community and baseball intersect. At any of the colleges you go to you can get a job in rec sports as a referee, a sports league coordinator, etc. Also the city parks and recreation department and YMCA, as well as little leagues all need refs. Since you have not had a job before, I think it is very important that your first job be baseball related in some fashion. Even at a batting cage, a sports memorabilia store, etc. You can also think about offering your own kids pitching lessons for \$10-\$20 an hour. Even if you offer your services as after school child care for a family who has boys you can market it as baseball practice or baseball coaching.</p>
<p><b>Comments</b></p>	<p>The first thing you have to do if you want to play baseball in college is fill out the NCAA clearinghouse application. I honestly would send info to them all and if you don't hear back, submit it again. You love baseball so you should keep playing somewhere! Now a place like a private university could ask you to come play and scholarship you, but the price of their tuition may make them still unrealistic, so you and your family have to decide what is best. **Follow Up**

<b>Math</b>	
<b>Summary</b>	You said you love math. Could you do it every day? If so there are a lot of jobs you could pursue related to math and combine them with baseball.
<b>Tools</b>	Check out some calculus books and see what you think of it, I think you said you have only been to Trig. Go to Khan Academy online and try some and see what you think. You can also take free math classes on coursera
<b>Classes, Colleges, Degrees, and Certifications</b>	If you like math as much as you say, be sure to check out the certificate "Actuary" at CSUSB If you can pass a calculus level 3 test you can be an actuary and start at 60K even without a degree.....but most people take their math classes at a college in order to prepare for that test but it is optional. After about 10 years actuaries make about 240K. 	What do you think about Sports Statistics? You are good at math and enjoy it. Read the papers at the link below about baseball statistics in particular. Was it interesting? There are degrees out there in sports statistics if so. <a href="http://web.stanford.edu/class/stats50/">http://web.stanford.edu/class/stats50/</a> I am very excited to see this.....we have a local sports analytics program. I think you need to go sit in on classes, meet the professors, and see if this is of interest to you if you find the above class at Stanford of interest. <b>Jobs/ internships/ volunteer work</b>	You can get a job in college tutoring college students or even kids in lower level math. There are also a lot of online places you can tutor which is a great flexible job while you are in school.
<b>Comments</b>	You can look at general math, accounting, business degrees that use math. Your mom said you may like engineering but you said you don't like science so I think you have to chat together and do more research on what engineering looks like because you could use math skills to engineer things like baseball bats, baseballs, baseball equipment etc. but if you don't like using math and science together, it would not be a good fit. If you find you would like to learn more about that I have all the links for those programs I can show you.
<b>Follow Up</b>	If you want to pursue math with science, just reach out to me.....I know a lot of good sports engineering programs but they are not local so I did not list them since the goal is to stay local.

<b>Criminal Justice</b>	
<b>Summary</b>	Criminal Justice can look different depending on the school you go to or how you pursue it. Some are more law focused, some more enforcement focused. Others are more theory and deviance or rehabilitation focused.
<b>Research</b>	Look into different employers for criminal justice and work backwards. Would you want to work for a university police department, a school police department, a city police department, the sheriffs office, a prison, a jail, a juvenile hall, probation, in community policing, in search and rescue, for the military, in secrete service, for the CHP, etc. There are so many agencies. I would then suggest getting on their websites and starting to work backwards from real jobs you see. Do they want you to go to an academy, have a 2 year degree, have a 4 year degree, go to the military, etc. Do you want to be inside, outside, in the community, in a facility, etc.? Do you want to enforce laws, create them, rehabilitate criminals, supervise criminals, work with teens or adults, write reports, patrol, educate, prevent crime, etc. Lots to think about.....what side of criminal justice do you like?
<b>Classes, Colleges, Degrees, and Certifications</b>	<p>If you are truly interested in law enforcement I think you need to check out the explorers and get involved in them this year so you can decide if it is for you or not and what you like and dont like. <b>Jobs/ internships/ volunteer work</b>	<p>If you decided to pursue criminal justice, I would look at jobs at sports complexes. You have to connect whatever you do to baseball or you will be very unsatisfied in your work. Even getting a part time job in security at a baseball stadium is a good first start.</p> <p>Another idea in this area is to combine criminal justice with school bullying and being a community resource officer on a school campus.</p>
<b>Follow Up</b>	Let me know if you do want to major in this and I can help you compare all the local school programs to find the best fit after you decide what branch of law enforcement you may like.

<b>Bullying</b>	
<b>Summary</b>	This seems to be an interest area that you have and could be passionate about and even combine baseball and law enforcement with.
<b>Research</b>	Look at real jobs related to working to stop and prevent bullying. <b>Classes, Colleges, Degrees, and Certifications</b>	Florida state has a research institute that is studying bully prevention in association with their school psychology program. Is something like this interesting to you? <b>Jobs/ internships/ volunteer work</b>	You can volunteer now to do presentations about bullying in younger grades and work with counselors to be a peer mediator.
<b>Comments</b>	I did a quick search on inland empire and bullying and did not find that much stuff so that is very sad.....maybe you can start some sort of a coalition or campaign or get more kids involved in changing things. If something like this document is interesting, you can start working on something related to this that is all kid led.
